## How to Use Octopus Card to Collect Vouchers


Step 1: Registration Method

Visit the Government's Consumption Voucher Scheme Website <u>www.consumptionvoucher.gov.hk/en</u> and fill in the name, HKID number, local mobile number with SMS enabled, along with the Octopus Card Number.

Step 2: Collection Arrangements and Schedule

After completing the registration process, a registration reference number will be received. Once the registration has been validated by the Government, an SMS confirmation will be received. Depending on the time of the successful registration, customers will be able to collect their Vouchers with their registered Octopus Card during the designated collection period.

The Vouchers will be disbursed in three instalments: HK\$2,000 in the first instalment, HK\$2,000 in the second instalment, and HK\$1,000 in the third instalment (cumulative eligible spending must reach HK\$4,000).



## Step 3: Voucher collection

You may tap your Octopus Card to collect Consumption Vouchers through the methods below:

01	Octopus App • Android - NFC enabled mobile devices • iOS - iPhone 7 or newer with iOS 13 or above, or connected with Octopus Mobile Reader;	02	Octopus Service Points Located at designated MTR station and shopping mall
03	Subsidy Collection Points Located at MTR station, light rail customer service center, designated public transport interchanges and designated ferry piers	04	<b>Retail Outlets</b> All outlets of 7-Eleven, Circle K, and Wellcome supermarket (including Market Place, Market Place by Jasons, Jasons ichiba and 3hreesixty)

## Coverage of the Vouchers

Vouchers can be used at local retail, catering and service outlets or their online platforms which accept payments by Octopus Card. Examples include retail shops, market stalls, department stores, supermarkets, convenient stores, restaurants, fast food shops, coffee shops, recreational facilities, beauty salons, public transport, taxis and car parks etc.

Vouchers cannot be used for the following transaction items:

- payment to the Government (e.g. tax, fines, licence fees, tunnel fees, parking meters)
- fees payable to public utilities (i.e. water, electricity and gas)
- fees payable to public organisations (e.g. Hospital Authority, Hong Kong Housing Authority, Hong Kong Housing Society)
- education expenses (i.e. fees payable to primary and secondary schools providing local and non-local curriculum, and UGC-funded universities)
- purchase of financial products or services (e.g. insurance)
- donation (including charitable, religious and political organisations)

- direct purchases from merchants located outside Hong Kong (including online purchases through non-local online platforms made locally)
- person to person payments
- encashment
